Dear Colleagues: As we enter the sixth (!) week of classes, I want to thank you all again for your good work and fortitude this semester. This has been such a challenging year and we have a way to go yet.

With the **General Election a month away**, many of us are pre-occupied with the voting process and outcome. The Office of Diversity & Inclusion will be offering a workshop for faculty on Thursday, October 22 from 3:00-4:30 p.m. titled *Election-Proof Your Classroom: Tools for Building Trust, Establishing Community Standards, and Managing Hot Moments.* Led by Lara Schwartz, founding director of the American University's Project on Civil Discourse, this interactive online session lays the groundwork for productive dialogue across difference; de-escalation and connected communication techniques; and collaborative feedback to address concerns raised in classes.
